Recommended Places to Visit in the Triangle and Beyond

The Triangle comprises three major cities that are home to three major universities – Raleigh (State Capitol and home to North Carolina State University), Durham (Duke University), and Chapel Hill (University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill).

Chapel Hill

Many good restaurants and bars can be found along <u>Franklin Street</u> in Chapel Hill. <u>Morehead</u> <u>Planetarium and Science Center</u> (where the Galaxy Gala will be held) is on the campus of UNC-Chapel Hill.

Durham is closest to Chapel Hill.

Major attractions in Durham include <u>Durham Bulls Athletic Park</u> (home of the minor league team) and nearby <u>American Tobacco Campus</u>. <u>Sarah P. Duke Gardens</u> on Duke campus and the nearby <u>Duke Chapel</u> are must sees when visiting Durham. Both are free to tour (with paid parking).

<u>Raleigh</u> is the largest of the three cities and the state capitol.

The <u>North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences</u> and the <u>North Carolina Museum of History</u> are free to tour and are next to each other in downtown Raleigh. Other historic buildings of interest include the <u>North Carolina State Capitol Building</u>, the General Assembly building, and The Governor's Mansion. The <u>North Carolina Museum of Art</u> is located in western Raleigh (between Raleigh and Chapel Hill) and include grounds for a nice leisurely stroll. The <u>Grand Lodge of</u> <u>North Carolina</u> offices are located in Raleigh.

Driving to Chapel Hill?

Entering North Carolina from the West (from Chattanooga)

Smoky Mountains and Cherokee

At the far western end of North Carolina, this area includes parts of the <u>Great Smoky Mountains</u> <u>National Park</u> and the Qualla Boundary – home to the <u>Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indians</u>.

Entering North Carolina from the West (via I-40)

Nestled in North Carolina's southern Blue Ridge Mountains, <u>Asheville</u> and its neighboring foothills towns exude quirky charm and character. The region's landscapes have starred in TV and film, and the area is a favorite among culinary travelers and outdoor enthusiasts alike for

its adventure, waterfalls and craft beer. Access to <u>Blue Ridge Parkway</u> – a relaxing drive revealing stunning long-range vistas.

Entering North Carolina from the South (via Charlotte)

Visit <u>NASCAR and auto-racing sites</u> in Charlotte (home of the NASCAR Hall of Fame), Concord (home to the Charlotte Motor Speedway), and Mooresville (home of the North Carolina Auto Racing Hall of Fame).
