

STONES OF WISDOM

LESSONS FROM THE QUARRY

THE ROUGH ASHLAR: WHERE OUR LABOR BEGINS

In the earliest days of the Craft, the rough ashlar represented the stone as it came from the quarry—full of potential, but still unshaped. It was the workman's task to apply his tools with patience and skill, removing what was unnecessary so that the stone might take its rightful place in the structure being raised. Operative Masons understood that no great building rose from perfect stones; it rose from imperfect stones made perfect through steady, faithful labor.

Speculative Masonry preserves this lesson. The rough ashlar is each of us at the beginning of our work: full of intention, promise, and raw material. But intention alone does not build anything. It is only through deliberate effort that the ashlar is shaped into something worthy of the Temple.

This is the work before Unity Lodge in 2026.

We begin this year with many intentions: to strengthen our committees, refine our operations, and renew the culture of our Lodge. But intentions must be shaped into action. Every great work is built one stone at a time, and the shaping of those stones requires Brothers who are willing to step forward, take up a tool, and contribute to the design.



FEW THINGS CAN HELP AN INDIVIDUAL MORE THAN TO PLACE RESPONSIBILITY ON HIM, AND TO LET HIM KNOW THAT YOU TRUST HIM.

When a Brother volunteers for a committee, offers his skills, or simply shows up with consistency, he is applying the common gavel to his own rough ashlar. He is removing the superfluous - hesitation, uncertainty, or the assumption that "someone else will do it" - and replacing it with the steady labor

that transforms potential into accomplishment. As more Brothers join in this work, the Lodge itself begins to take shape, moving from the roughness of intention toward the symmetry and strength of a perfect ashlar.

Forming our committees, clarifying our operations, and renewing our culture are not administrative tasks; they are acts of craftsmanship that will become the cornerstone of our Lodge. No single Brother can carry this labor, and the outcome of this year's work will be determined by the many hands that touch it, not the few.

Every Brother has a place in the quarry and a tool that is his to apply. Each contribution—large or small, visible or quiet—helps shape Unity into the Lodge that we will hand to those who follow. As we continue this new year, let us take up the work with purpose. Let us shape our intentions into action, our raw material into strength, and Unity Lodge into a perfect ashlar worthy of the Craft.
